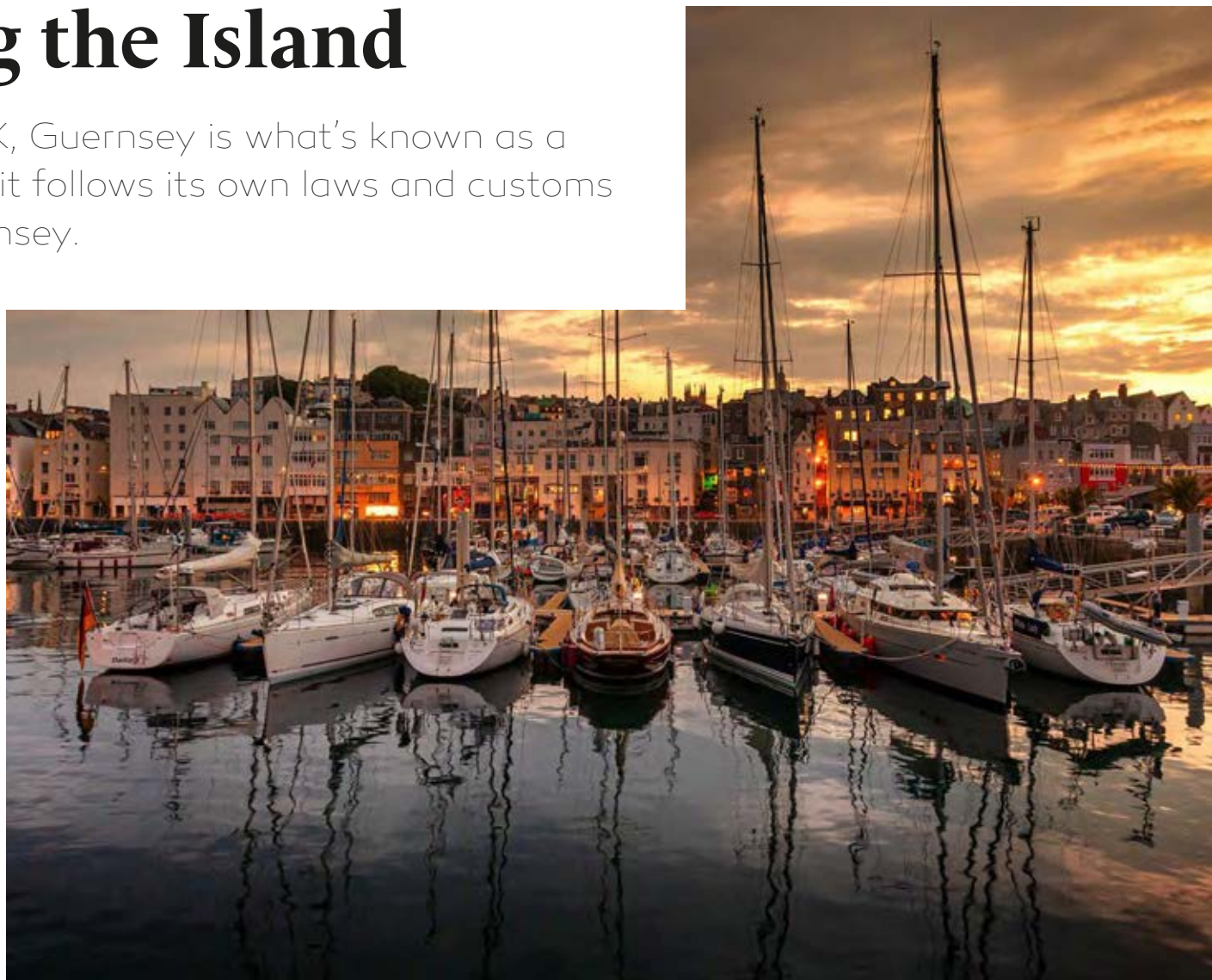
Understanding the Island

The island is effectively independent but comes under the protective wing of the British Government when it comes to international security. It is known for its stability, independence and security - increasingly desirable qualities for those who live here and do business with the jurisdiction.

A Little History

The island has lived under the rule of the Romans, French armies and British kings, and in more recent history was occupied by the German army during World War II. Nowadays, the UK is Guernsey's biggest trading partner but the island has its own banknotes and system of government.

The States of Guernsey is comprised of elected deputies and a committee-based style of government sits for a term of four years.

Did You Know?

*The island was home to Victor Hugo, who wrote **Les Misérables** and **Toilers of the Sea** whilst he was living in exile in Guernsey.*

*Pierre-Auguste Renoir captured one of Guernsey's most beautiful bays, **Moulin Huet**, in 15 different pictures during a visit to the island in 1855.*

*Guernsey has its own language, **Guernésiais**, and many road signs and surnames have French origins.*

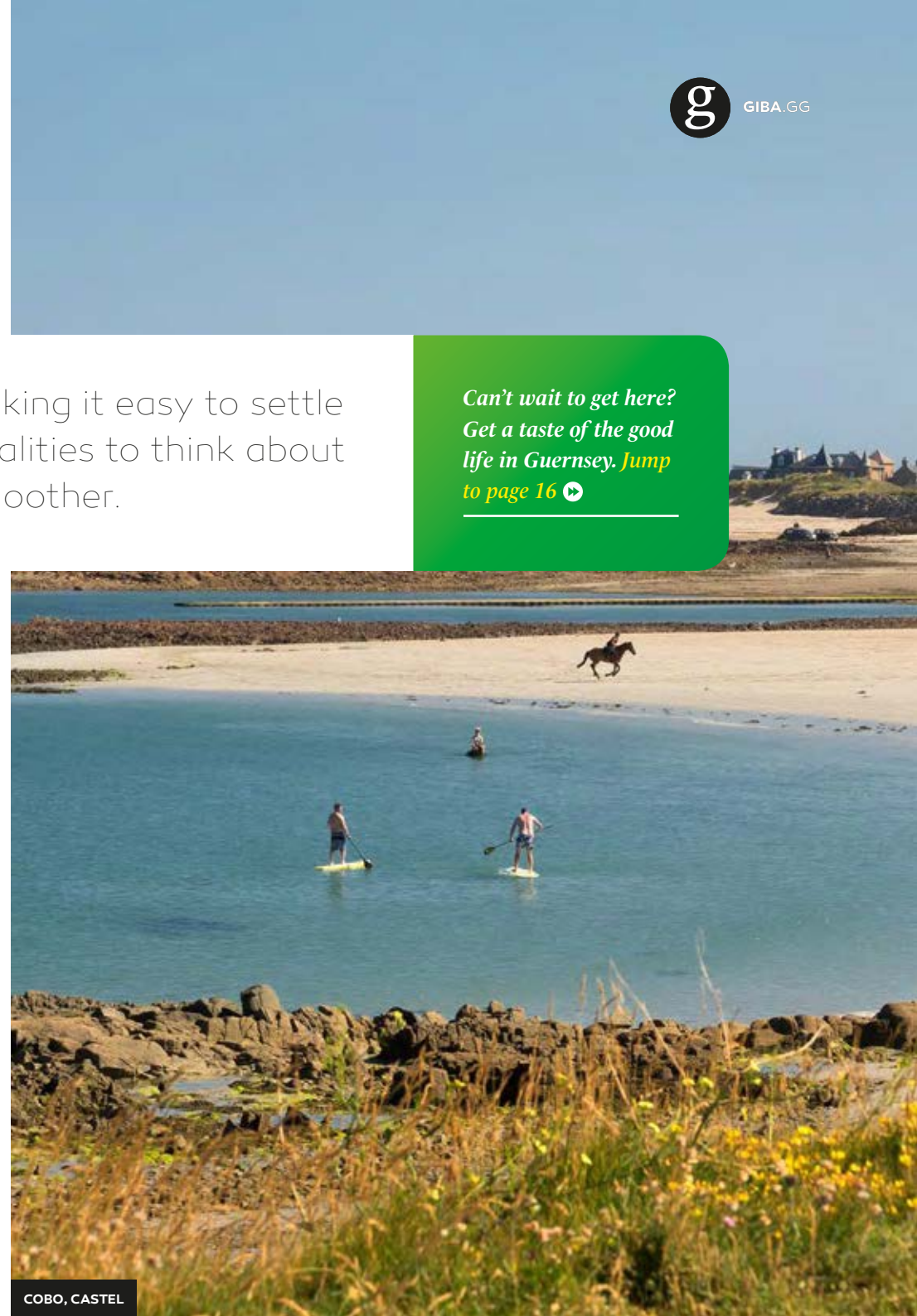
Your Health in Good Hands

Guernsey has an excellent healthcare system, accessed through its numerous medical centres and the Princess Elizabeth Hospital (PEH). Secondary or specialist care is delivered through the Medical Specialist Group.

GP practices are private, although subsidised by your Social Security payments, and any emergency medical treatment you receive also has to be paid by the patient.

Registering with a GP is relatively easy, and patients don't often have to wait long for an appointment. You might also consider health insurance for the whole family, to give you peace of mind that you're covered if you need it.

The local healthcare system also links into the NHS in the UK for specific specialist or emergency care needs.

Education for All

Guernsey's education system has an excellent reputation. Children follow the GCSE and A-level curriculum, and the island also boasts first-class private education via its three independent colleges.

Primary schools are allocated by catchment area and the **education system** in Guernsey is very similar to that in the UK. Children stay in primary education until they are 11, when they move on to secondary school.

There is a local **College of Further Education (CFE)**, and a lot of continual professional development can be accessed through the **Guernsey Training Agency (GTA)**. Employers on the island generally take professional development very seriously and much of that provision can be accessed on the island.

Travelling - Home and Away

Guernsey has frequent flights to various UK and European destinations with flights from London Gatwick taking as little as 45 minutes.

Regular ferries operate between Guernsey and the UK, as well as to Jersey and France.

Ferries to Guernsey from Poole take as little as three hours and a traditional 'all-weather ferry' operates all year round from Portsmouth.

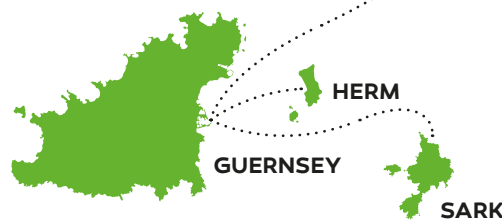
Travelling between the Bailiwick islands is also refreshingly simple - Herm and Sark are easily accessible by ferry from Guernsey and are popular destinations for a day trip or weekend break. Island hopping is a popular summer pastime, with more pristine beaches and secluded coves right on the doorstep.

Understanding Guernsey's Property Market

Guernsey is unique in that it operates a two-tier property structure for both rental and sales properties:

- **Local Market** is available for locals and for Employment Permit holders.
- **Open Market** is for anyone who holds a British or EEA passport. If you hold a Certificate or Permit to live in the Open Market you can undertake any employment.

Open Market properties do tend to be more expensive than those in the Local Market, however subject to any immigration restrictions you will find this a very easy way to establish yourself in Guernsey.

The **Population Management Office** processes all Certificate and Permit applications online.

Choosing a Property Partner

The island's estate agents are used to helping people from the UK and beyond to find a home in Guernsey.

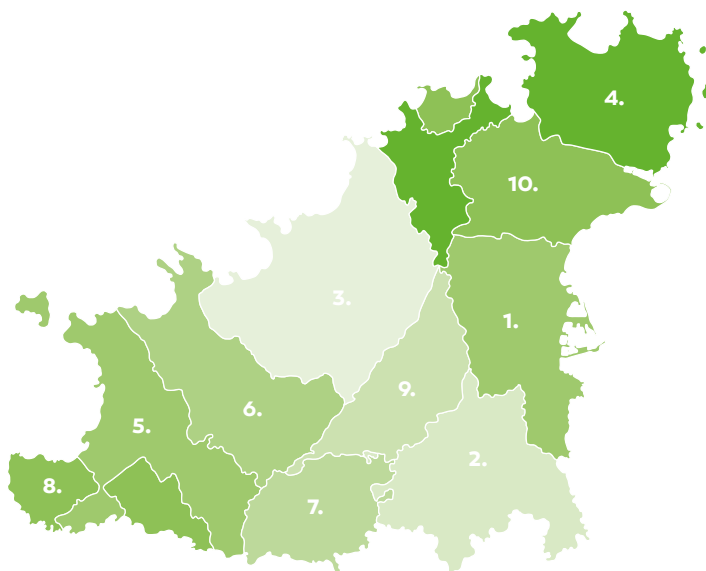

Exploring Guernsey's Parishes

Where do you want to put down your roots - coast, countryside, village or town? The island's 10 parishes all have a unique character and a wealth of desirable properties of all sizes to choose from:



1. St Peter Port is the most populated parish and Guernsey's main town. It's famed for its scenic harbour, cobbled streets and rich architectural history.

2. St Martin is one of the most popular parishes. Close to town, it boasts spectacular coastal paths, cliff-top views and winding country lanes.

3. Castel, the island's largest parish, occupies part of the centre of the island while extending down to some of Guernsey's finest beaches on the west coast.

4. Vale includes L'Ancrese Common, the island's largest area of open land, an 18-hole links golf course, beautiful beaches and various fascinating archaeological sites.

5. St Peter is one of the more rural parishes. There is a small village at its centre with a unique church.

6. St Saviour is Guernsey's most rural parish. Boasting rolling countryside and quiet lanes, picturesque valleys lead down from the beautiful parish church.

7. Forest is the highest parish on the island, with leafy lanes that wind down to a stunning coastline.

8. Torteval is the remotest of Guernsey's parishes. Forming the south-western corner of the island, parishioners here have an independent spirit focused around a livelihood earned from boat-building, fishing and the land.

9. St Andrew is the only parish that does not border the sea and is located right in the centre of Guernsey. Its Little Chapel is the main attraction and reputed to be the world's smallest consecrated church.

10. St Sampson is the second largest town in Guernsey and is also affectionately known as 'The Bridge'. Now a recreational marina, the harbour here used to be the export hub of Guernsey's renowned granite industry.

Banking

Most UK high street banks can be found in Guernsey, often as an offshore subsidiary, which simplifies setting up a personal or business bank account. There are also a number of private banks to choose from.

Social Security

Payment of Social Security contributions is compulsory and provides individuals with a number of benefits. Both the employer and employee contribute and you'll just need to register with the **Social Security** services team in person or by post to get started.

Tax

The island has developed its own system of taxation for its residents. In comparison to many other jurisdictions, **tax in Guernsey** is straightforward; there are caps on the amount of income tax payable by residents and the island has no inheritance, estate or gifts taxes, no wealth tax, no taxes on capital gains and no VAT or sales taxes.

Cars & Driving

Many new residents choose to bring their car to Guernsey. A verbal declaration to Guernsey Customs is usually sufficient and there's no need to pay any Customs Import Duty.

The vehicle's current and original registration documentation are needed to re-register a car. You also have a year to register for your **Guernsey driving licence**.

For most, driving in Guernsey will be a new and interesting experience. The roads are narrower, road names are often in French and the island has some unique and quaint traffic systems, including filter-in-turns and the tiny Ruettes Tranquilles lanes.

The island's first-class restaurants, lively pubs, excellent sports facilities, music, arts scene and theatre mean there is a lot to do locally, and because it's all so close, islanders can pack a lot into their weekends and evenings.

Turf

Red prides itself on sourcing the best quality produce, making it the go-to restaurant for steak lovers.

Situated on the edge of the harbour, **The Slaughterhouse** has been reborn with a firm culinary nod to its meaty past.

The Rock Garden serves fine steaks, from Herefordshire-reared fillets to melt-in-the-mouth Brazilian ribeye.

In the heart of St Peter Port, you'll find **Le Petit Bistro** – rustic, romantic and authentic French cuisine.

Les Douvres offers delicious gastropub-inspired dining using seasonal and local produce.

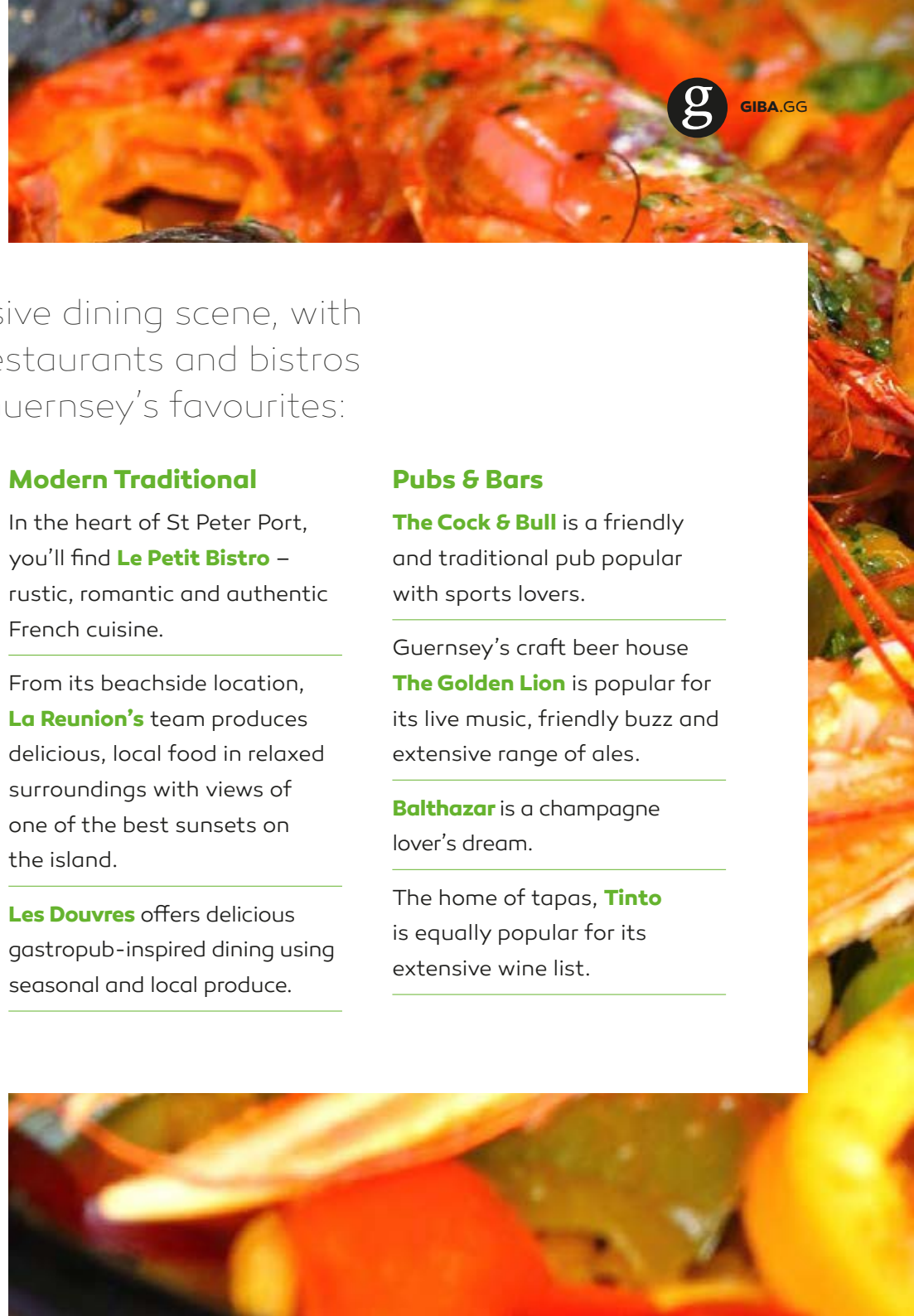
Pubs & Bars

Harnessing a Competitive Spirit

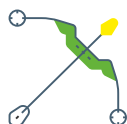

Only three miles wide, Herm is also home to Europe's most southerly puffin breeding colony and Shell Beach, a stunning stretch of coastline with crystal-clear water.

Sark

Cars are prohibited, making it an appealing option for cyclists and those keen to experience the island's unique charm and world-renowned horse-drawn carriages. It also has Dark Sky status, making it a stargazer's paradise.

Every 9th May, islanders celebrate the liberation of Guernsey from German occupation with a host of family-friendly celebrations.

Guernsey Literary Festival

Cobo Balcony Gigs

A major part of Guernsey summers, these gigs bring a real carnival atmosphere to the Cobo seafront whilst raising funds for local charities.
